Strengthening Families Grant Awarded to Home Ties

Home Ties Child Development Center in Elkins, WV was the recent recipient of a Strengthening Families grant. The West Virginia Early Childhood Health Project contracted with the Division of Early Care and Education to establish one Strengthening Families center within each child care resource and referral region. The six regional sites will make up the West Virginia Strengthening Families Network. These sites will receive training in Strengthening Families and will serve as mentors to other programs around the state who have expressed an interest in implementing Strengthening Families.

The Strengthening Families approach and the Protective Factors are formed by extensive, rigorous research from the Center for the Study of Social Policy. The five protective factors are the foundation of the Strengthening Families approach.

The Protective Factors are: Parental Resilience, Social Connections, Knowledge of Parenting and Child Development, Concrete Supports in Times of Need and Children's Social and Emotional Competence.

This grant enabled Home Ties to develop a welcoming family area large enough for families to meet informally, watch modeling of appropriate child development behavior, formulate friendships with other parents, and foster a sense of community. Denise Fletcher, Director, states "Through the Strengthening Families grant we were able to provide a warm, inviting space where families can gather and network. We are very pleased with the center and feel it promotes positive relationships within families."

The Creative Curriculum

What is curriculum? Curriculum is a plan. It is a plan of action that an adult has for teaching. For the sake of this article we are talking about a plan for children in child care. Do you have a plan or are you following a formal curriculum for the children that you work with?

The Creative Curriculum is a particular plan for children that is used frequently throughout the United States. It is based on how children learn, what children learn, a teacher's role, a parent's role and the physical environment. The physical environment is split into interest areas or "stations" for the children to explore, learn and play. Depending on the size of your space for the children, you may have as many as ten interest areas that would comprise of a block area, house corner, table toys or small manipulatives, art, sand and water area, library or reading area, music and movement, cooking, computers and outdoor area.

You can learn more about the Creative Curriculum by reading "The Creative Curriculum for Early Childhood Third Edition" by Diane Trister Dodge and Laura J. Colker. You can also attend a training that MountainHeart is offering this quarter regarding themes to use with the children based on the Creative Curriculum philosophy.

Cozy Up Your I/T Space

Cozy up an area of your Infant/Toddler Space using the following recommendations from the Infant/Toddler Environment Rating Scale-Revised (ITERS-R):

- *A special cozy area that provides substantial softness is accessible much of the day.
- *The cozy area is protected from active play.
- *At least 10 soft toys such as cloth or vinyl covered foam blocks, cloth dolls, animals and puppets are available.
- *The cozy area is used for reading or other quiet play.

The cozy area is a great place to repurpose some of those old crib mattresses from the recent crib recall. Simply put a waterproof cover and fitted sheet on 1 or 2 mattresses, add a couple soft pillows and then sit back and enjoy some quite cuddle time with your little ones. Everyone will enjoy the close times together.

Take It Outside! Week / October 16th-22nd

Head Start Body Start National Center for Physical Development and Outdoor Play (HSBS) believes that children and the outdoors naturally go together, and that is why they are sponsoring "Take It Outside!" Week, October 16th through October 22nd. Educators, along with children and families, need to make outdoor play time a priority as it is an important part of a child's development.

This generation of children spends less time outdoors than previous generations, and more time in front of the TV, computer, and other types of electronic media. Research shows that this is detrimental to their development physically, emotionally, and mentally. Studies show that children who regularly play outdoors are healthier, happier, and smarter than children who do

not. Outdoor play also helps to build up the immune system, as well exposes children to Vitamin D. Why not celebrate this week with your children and families? Here are some ideas to get outside:

- Host a play day with lots of outdoor games and activities.
- Go for a nature hike (look for objects along the way like acorns, colored leaves, etc.).
- Create an outdoor reading area, and read a different nature story each day, and act it
- Dramatic play can also be done outside (pretend you are birds and fly high, low, fast, slow).
- Create a Fall themed obstacle course with tasks along the way such as moving piles of leaves from one spot to another, roll the pumpkin, and crawl over hay bales.

You are only limited by your creativity. Weather can be a factor in outdoor play, but remember, "There is no such thing as bad weather, just bad clothing." So bundle up and head OUTSIDE! This unique opportunity is called "Camp Gizmo". The campus of the West Virginia Schools for the Deaf and Blind in Romney, West Virginia hosted this fantastic event for families and professionals. For a small fee, any family in West Virginia whose child has a disability may attend this four day event. Each family is paired with a team of professionals who work specifically on improving the quality of life for the whole family. While children are in "kids" camp classes, the adults are attending workshops to help them with some of the challenges they struggle with on a daily basis. Some of these challenges include feeding methods, safety, parents' legal rights and computer modifications.

MountainHeart Community Services has been invited to participate in this unique opportunity for ten years. Janet Aitchison and Cheryl Wolfe, TRAILS Early Childhood Specialists, had the great opportunity to attend this event on Monday, July 11, 2011. They join other professionals on a resource panel for parents to gain knowledge on the different resources and programs that are available for their children. Health and Safety Grant

The 2011-2012 provider health and safety grant application is included in this edition of *News From The Heart*. This grant is available to family child care facilities and family child care providers who accept subsidy payments for children in their care. A child care facility may request up to \$500 for resources and a family child care provider may request up to \$250 in resources. The grant application no longer lists acceptable items to request. This opens up more possibilities for providers to request items they may want or need. We highly suggest that you fulfill your licensing requirements for health and safety before requesting educational and recreational items. Early Childhood Specialists Offering Technical Assistance

As a teacher in an early childhood setting, you may find that you need some extra help setting up your class-room, preparing for activities, or maybe handling stressful situations with parents or children. It's important to know when to ask for help, and that the staff at MountainHeart Child Care Resource and Referral can assist you. The Early Childhood Specialists at MountainHeart offer technical assistance visits to early childhood teachers employed at child care centers, as well as family child care providers caring for children in their home. The purpose of a technical assistance visit is to increase the quality of care that teachers are providing to the children in our community. Through the process of technical assistance, teachers will work collaboratively with an Early Childhood Specialist to develop an improvement plan for his or her classroom/home environment. Depending on the teacher's individual needs, the plan will be put into action through the use of different resources, such as materials from the TRAILS van or modeling specific activities to try in the classroom/home. TEACHING BY EXAMPLE

Today is a big day in your preschool room. The children are looking forward to making their own mini-pizzas. You've carefully organized this activity, placing all the ingredients on paper plates at each child's spot at the table. You've divided the class into two small groups so that you and your aide will be able to help and supervise the children more easily.

When the children are seated and quiet, you demonstrate each step of the process, using simple, careful language. The children are excited when you take the large tray of pizzas to the oven. When you bring the bubbling pizzas back to the table, all eyes are on you. You pick up your pizza, take a hearty bite, and then yell loudly as hot cheese burns your tongue. The children watch with wide eyed concern as you gasp, red faced, with tears running down your cheeks. After a long drink of cold water, you serve the children's pizzas. Despite the mouth watering smell of warm pizza, most of the children need a lot of encouragement to take their first bite!

Modeling - teaching actions or behaviors by our own example - is an important teaching tool. Modeling can be planned or unplanned. In the example above, the teacher planned to use modeling to teach the steps for making a pizza. She did not plan to use modeling to teach that pizza burns, but that's just what happened!

Children learn what they see. They look to all of the adults in their lives for guidance. They watch, they absorb, and they practice the social behaviors we demonstrate all through the day, whether we're aware if their attention or not. It is our responsibility to provide positive social models for our children. We must think carefully about the lessons that our words and actions teach. How can we best support our children's social learning? Here are just a few everyday examples that show how you can use modeling to teach social skills:

Sharing - "It looks like your paint cup is empty. Here, you can use this one with me."


Helping- "It looks like you could use some help cleaning up here.
I'd be glad to put these cars in the basket for you."

Taking Turns - "It's your turn now, and then it will be my turn."

Negotiating - "You want the last cookie and Sam wants the last cookie. If I split it in half, you could both have some. Would that be ok with you?"

Delaying gratification - "I really want to come outside with you now, but I promised Ms. Jean that I'd put the cots away first. You can go ahead with Ms. Jean, and I'll be there as soon as I'm done!"

Problem solving - "Oh dear, we won't have time for our painting activity this morning. I wonder how we can fit it in this afternoon?"



Self calming – "All this noise is making me feel edgy! I need to find a quiet place to calm down!"

Awareness of own emotions – "I am so happy! I finally got the dishes washed!"

Recognizing others' feelings – "You have such a big smile this morning. Did something make you extra happy today?"

Medication Administration Training

Medication Administration training is being offered in our region. As per center licensing requirements, staff members who work in child care centers or Head Start and who administer medication must have medication administration training. These trainings are conducted through the WV DHHR Early Care and Education office & are WV S.T.A.R.S. approved.

October 17, 2011 (Monday) at 1:00 pm in Ranson (Ranson City Hall)

October 18, 2011 (Tuesday) at 9:00 am in Martinsburg (James Rumsey Technical Center)

November 15, 2011 (Tuesday) at 5:00 pm in Buckhannon (Child Development Center)

November 17, 2011 (Thursday) at 11:00 am in Grafton (Taylor Co. Public Library)

You **MUST PRE-REGISTER at least five (5) days in advance of the training session** by calling the Elkins MountainHeart office at (304) 637-2840 or 1-877-862-3103 (toll free).

IMPORTANT NOTICE: Staff members must be registered on the WV S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway before taking the medication administration training. You will not be permitted to attend the training session if you are not currently on the S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway. All participants will need to bring their S.T.A.R.S. Pathway certificate with ID number and/or their feedback letter from WV S.T.A.R.S. stating that they have been approved and their certificate will be mailed soon. If staff attend the training and are not on the S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway, the training will not count towards licensing requirements.

The training session is 4 ½ hours long (including two 15 minute breaks).

Each participant must bring the following materials to the training: pen, paper, 1 pair of non-latex gloves.

Reminder: Children may not attend the training session.

WV Elements of Family Child Care Series

The WVEFCCS was developed for trainers and family child care providers to improve the quality of early care and education for our state's children. WVEFCCS is a seven part series that provides an overview of *The Creative Curriculum for Family Child Care* and the *Family Child Care Environment Rating Scale-Revised (FCCERS-R)*. The topics range from "Becoming a Professional" and "Organizing Your Day" to "What Children are Learning" and "Working with Parents." The series is presented in 4-hour sessions with two technical assistance visits to ensure training objectives are met. This totals 30 hours of professional development. The WV Elements of Family Child Care Services is a special opportunity to engage with other family child care providers in a small group classroom experience. In addition, you will receive the Creative Curriculum manual and the FCCERS-R handbook.

You must be registered with WV STARS prior to being able to participate in this training, and you must be caring for subsidized children to receive free resources at the completion of the classes.

Training Topics Offered October-December 2011

<u>Becoming a WV STAR.</u> Core Knowledge: Professionalism. Interested in participating in a statewide early care and education professional development system? Then this training is for you. Tara Bowley will teach this two hour training in which participants will be given information on WV STARS, resume writing, and help with the application process. This training is only for providers who are not currently on the WV STARS Career Pathway. (Beginner)

<u>Do You See What I See? Part Two.</u> Core Knowledge: Child Observation and Assessment. What should you document through observations? When should you observe children? Why do observations? What do you do with all the information once it is collected? These are some questions that will be answered through this training that Melodee Price will facilitate. As child care providers, we must understand how to use ongoing observation, documentation and assessment to develop themes for our curriculum, plan and make needed referrals. (Intermediate)

<u>Family Child Care Record Keeping</u>. Core Knowledge: Program Management. Family home providers and facility owners will learn about their business expenses, deducting business expenses and how to stay organized. You will benefit from this training since tax season is just around the corner. Melodee Price will facilitate this training for the self employed family child care providers and facility owners. (Beginner)

<u>Making a Difference</u>. Core Knowledge: Health, Safety and Nutrition. This training will count towards two hours of child abuse and neglect that is required of center based staff within the first six months of employment; according to child care center regulations. Center staff need this training every three years after initially taking a child abuse class. This training will help you to know when and how to facilitate a family's linkage to assistance and support before child maltreatment occurs. It will focus more on preventative measures in regards to child abuse and neglect. (Beginner)

<u>Super Simple Science.</u> Core Knowledge: Curriculum. Tara Bowley will teach this two hour training in which participants will be taking part in several simple science activities that can be done with children of various age groups. Come prepared for hands on fun! (Beginner)

The Ins and Outs of Themes in the Creative Curriculum. Core Knowledge: 1 hour Child Growth and Development, 1 hour Curriculum. Child care providers should select themes on the basis of what they know about the interests of the children. Melodee Price will help you to learn how to select an appropriate theme for the children that you work with, the steps in planning a theme, incorporating all the interest areas/stations with the theme, inviting parents to participate in the theme and also the conclusion of your theme. This will be based on the Creative Curriculum philosophy and theory. (Intermediate)
