Your Economic Stimulus Benefit!!!

According to the IRS, the only way to receive your rebate is to <u>file a tax return</u> for 2007. Even people who only receive Social Security or Veteran's Benefits will need to file to receive their benefit. The \$168 billion economic stimulus package President Bush signed into law provides checks from \$300-\$600 for most individuals, \$600-\$1200 for couples, plus an additional \$300 for each child who qualifies for the Child Tax Credit. People who owe taxes will receive up to their maximum benefit as a tax rebate, while people who do not owe the government taxes will still receive the minimum amount <u>IF THEY FILE!!!</u>

To qualify, an individual or couple must make at least \$3000 of qualifying income. Each child must be eligible under the Child Tax Credit, under age 17, and have a valid Social Security Number. Qualifying income includes Social Security Benefits, certain Railroad Retirement benefits, certain Veteran's Benefits, and Earned Income; however Supplemental Security Income (SSI) does NOT qualify.

West Virginia Infant/Toddler Professional Development Program

Do you work with children birth to 35 months of age? Come network with other providers as we learn about the importance of caring for yourself, developing positive relationships with families, supporting children's development and providing a quality program for infants and toddlers. WVIT is a 50 hour (10 sessions) course. Participants must be registered with STARS prior to beginning class and work at least 20 hours per

week with children under age three. Upon completion, participants will be eligible for <u>Free Resources</u> for use in their child care home or center. Classes will be rotated between Mineral and Hardy Counties. We will confirm location information when you call to register.

MEDICATION ADMINISTRATION TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES

Medication Administration training is being offered in our region. As per center licensing requirements, staff members who work in child care centers or Head Start and who administer medication must have medication administration training. These trainings are conducted through the WV DHHR Early Care and Education office & are WV S.T.A.R.S. approved. Training dates and sites are as follows:

April 10, 2008 (Thursday) at 4:00 pm at Elkins (Days Inn) April 18, 2008 (Friday) at 9:30 am at Moorefield (Public Library) May 5, 2008 (Monday) at 9:00 am at Inwood (Inwood Family Worship Center) May 15, 2008 (Thursday) at 9:00 am at Romney (Bank of Romney Community Center) May 30, 2008 (Friday) at 9:00 am at Kingwood (Wesley UM Church) June 3, 2008 (Tuesday) at 9:00 am at Ranson (Lion's Club) June 26, 2008 (Thursday) at 9:00 am at Martinsburg (MountainHeart Office)

Class sizes are limited. Slots will be filled on a first come, first serve basis. You MUST PRE-REGISTER at least five (5) days in advance of the training session by calling the Elkins MountainHeart office at (304) 637-2840 or 1-877-862-3103 (toll free).

Space is limited. Only twelve participants per class will be allowed. If all spaces are taken, you may place staff members on the waiting list in the event that a slot becomes available. If the minimum number of participants is not met for a training session, the session will be cancelled.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: Staff members must be registered on the WV S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway before taking the medication administration training. You will not be permitted to attend the training session if you are not currently on



the S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway. All participants will need to bring their S.T.A.R.S. Pathway certificate with ID number and/or their feedback letter from WV STARS stating that they have been approved and their certificate will be mailed soon. If staff attend the training and are not on the S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway, the training will not count towards licensing requirements.

The training session is 4 ½ hours long (including two 15 minute breaks). A lunch or supper break is not included in the schedule. Please bring a snack if you feel that you will need one.

Participants must pass the Medication Administration competency test with 80% accuracy in order to pass the training and obtain a certificate.

Each participant must bring the following materials to the training: Pencil or pen Paper 1 pair of non-latex gloves 1 doll baby

Reminder: Children may not attend the training session.

Training Topics offered April through June 2008

Regulations, Policy and Quality Standards. Core Competency: Program Management. Melodee Price will review current regulations and policies for the family home provider. This two hour training will be tailored for selfemployed people who provide child care services out of their homes. (Tier I)

Food Budgeting. Core Competency: Program Management. Learn how to plan and carry out a food budget, and to conduct and maintain the inventory of supplies, materials, and equipment. This training will also help you to understand the nutritional needs as specified under USDA/CACFP. Staff from the WV Extension Services will provide this session. (Tier II).

Professional Expectations in the Child Care Field. Core Competency: Professionalism. What is expected of you as a child care provider by the state of West Virginia? By MountainHeart? By the parents and children that you serve? How can you meet all the needs of the community, government and yourself in the field of child care? Come to this information session and learn your role as a professional child care worker. (Tier II)

School Age Environment Rating Scale. Core Competency: Curriculum. If you work with school agers, you may be interested in learning about the School Age Environment Rating Scale (SACERS). It is a way to evaluate your program for the children that you serve, five to twelve years of age. (Tier II)

Cultural Diversity. Core Competency: Family and Community. What does this politically correct term mean? How do we incorporate diversity in our program? Design an environment that reflects sensitivity and acceptance of diverse family structures, values, cultures and languages. Hands on, make and take activities to use with the children you work with. (Tier II) Assessment and Behavioral Issues. Core Competency: Positive Interactions and Relationships. The class will provide information about using a developmental checklist and sharing it's information with parents. Jim Weber will discuss behavioral issues and intervention techniques for children. (Tier II)

MRSA and Other Health Concerns. Core Competency: Health, Safety and Nutrition. Sarah Hicks, RN, will present information on Methicillin Resistant Staphylococcus Aureus (MRSA) and other health concerns. Information will include how the diseases are transmitted, signs and symptoms, treatment and preventative measures. (Tier II)

Child Abuse and Neglect. Core Competency: Health, Safety and Nutrition. Jim Weber spent a number of years working with abused and neglected children in the foster care system. He will share his expertise in the field which will count towards 2 hours of Child Abuse training. (Tier II)

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. Core Competency: Health, Safety and Nutrition. This two hour training will count as Infant/ Toddler credit. It will give you facts about Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), reducing the risk of SIDS and information about the success of the "Back to Sleep Campaign." (Tier II)

Recognize and React to Child Abuse. Core Competency: Health, Safety and Nutrition. Melodee Price will teach this class that will count as 2 hours of Child Abuse training. You will gain knowledge in the field of abuse and begin to feel more confident when ensuring that state mandated child abuse and neglect regulations are followed. (Tier II).

Shaken Baby Syndrome. Core Competency: Health, Safety and Nutrition. This training will count towards 2 hours of Infant/ Toddler credit. You will learn the signs and symptoms of this ever growing form of child abuse. We will review the state mandated child abuse and neglect regulations. Anger management techniques will also be discussed and practiced. (Tier I)

Super SATURDAY Topics

Traumatic Brain Injury. Core Competency: Health Safety and Nutrition. Scott Davis from the Traumatic Brain Injury Program at the Center for Excellence in Disabilities, a part of West Virginia University, Robert C. Byrd Health Sciences Center will present information pertaining to traumatic brain injury for children ages birth through 12 years of age. (Tier II)

Internet Safety. Core Competency: Positive Interactions and Relationships. A WV State Trooper will give an informative training regarding playing it safe with the Internet. He will explain about the dangers of children posting personal information on the internet, myspace, facebook, etc. Plan, implement and adapt a supportive learning environment that promotes positive interactions and behaviors and minimizes risk. (Tier II)

Music and Movement in the Early Childhood Setting. Core Competency: Curriculum. Gina Raschella, director of Catamount Children's Center, Inc. will provide a make and take training in which you will construct musical instruments from everyday objects. Come and join in the fun with this hands on activity that is sure to have you moving and grooving with your little ones. (Tier II)

Know who kids are chatting with. Keep computers in a common area not in a bedroom. Most importantly talk with them about this danger.


Some red flags to be aware of:

- Gifts sent to a child from someone the parents do not know
- Phone calls from unknown adults for the child
- A child who spends a lot of time online, but doesn't say much about it
- A child who has tried to hide what he or she is doing online
- A child who begins to behave differently, especially more aggressively


<u>**Consolidate shopping trips</u>** - Run all your errands at once, shop weekly, car pool when possible, keep your tires properly inflated.</u>

MountainHeart Community Services will be offering **FREE** Tax Preparation for any individuals with the annual income up to \$36,000. MountainHeart Community Services have trained volunteers who will prepare your taxes, figure the earned income credit if you qualify and the child tax credit. In addition, our trained volunteers will e-file the return to aid in a quicker refund. We can also set up the return to be direct deposited into your checking or savings account. Most refunds are received by your bank in 6-10 days. Save money and get all of your return for yourself. Contact the MountainHeart Community Services office near you.

Here are the items that you will need to have to make this preparation go quickly and smoothly:

* Current Photo ID

- * Social Security Card with correct name on it
- * All W-2's for 2007
- * 2006 Tax return if available.
- * All children's names, correct social security numbers and birth dates

* Receipt from Daycare Provider for daycare services used during 2007. Include the amount per child. If multiple children attending daycare, include provider's Social Security number or Tax ID number and the name and address of daycare provider.

* Any school loans or college tuition information.

* Any other tax documents.
