West Virginia Wesleyan College was presented the award by Leann Andrew,



# Poison Prevention

Poisoning occurs when a person swallows, breathes, touches, or gets splashed in the eye with something that can cause sickness or death. Almost 1.3 million children under 5 are exposed to a poison each year. The leading causes of poisoning in children are cosmetic products (perfumes, nail polish, deodorants, soaps), cleaning products (floor cleaners, sprays, detergents), medications, poisonous plants, and insect stings.

Prevention is the key! Keep all poisonous products locked up and out of sight. Choose products in containers that are hard for children to open. Replace the lids tightly after use, but even "childproof" lids can still be opened by a child. Keep products in the original container, and leave all labels on for easy identification. When products are in use, never let young children out of sight! Children can act fast, often exploring things with their mouths. Keep household plants out of reach. Replace lead based paints, and check recalls often to make sure toys are free of lead products.

# Trails Tips

A painting project for young artists and busy caregivers requires tempera paint, egg cartons, Q-tips, small paint brushes and paper. Cut an empty egg carton into thirds so that you have 4 "cups" in each. Fill cups half full. One cup with red, one with blue, one with yellow, and one with green tempera



paint. Give each little artist a Qtip and blank piece of paper and let them create a masterpiece. When they are finished, put the cups on a shelf and allow them to dry out.

Next painting session, give each child a paint brush and a small container of water with their paper. They can now watercolor (for a lot less money than the store bought variety of watercolors). Be sure to have artists sign their work and display it where everyone can enjoy it!

## How to Develop a Green Thumb

Few things are more exciting for children than digging in the dirt. There are lots of things to see including rocks, worms and bugs. Textures can be fascinating as well. Some soils are dry and sandy while others are wet and sticky. Gardening can stimulate a new interest for children. If their first experiences are fun and successful, chances are that they might develop a green thumb that will stay with them for a lifetime.

Use the gardening activities to talk to your child. These discussions can be expanded into a learning experience on many developmental levels. Discuss shapes, sizes and colors. Sharing information about which plants need sun and which ones prefer a cooler area will add to the child's general knowledge. Do something to reinforce what everyone has learned. Talk about what went on, who did what and who saw what. After watching, watering and weeding this summer, you and

### **Trainer Receives Certification**

Shannon Nichols, Infant/Toddler Specialist, completed the certification process for the Program for Infant/Toddler Care (PITC). She began the process in July 2008 by attending a week long training in Baltimore, MD and attended a second week long training in Riverside, California in January 2009. Upon completion of the trainings, she had to write a lengthy paper to demonstrate her understanding of the PITC philosophy and program goals.

PITC is a nationally recognized program displaying best practice in infant/toddler care. The goal of PITC is to help infant/toddler care teachers recognize the crucial importance of giving tender, loving care and assisting in the infants' intellectual development through an attentive reading of each child's cues. Six program policies anchor PITC's work: primary care; small groups; continuity; individualized care; cultural responsiveness; and, inclusion of children with special needs. These policies create a climate for care that reinforces our responsive, relationship based approach. They allow relationships to develop and deepen over time between infant/toddler care teachers and the children as well as between infant/toddler care teachers and the children's families.

# Medication Administration Training

Medication Administration training is being offered in our region. As per center licensing requirements, staff members who work in child care centers or Head Start and who administer medication must have medication administration training. These trainings are conducted through the WV DHHR Early Care and Education office & are WV S.T.A.R.S. approved. Training dates and sites are as follows:

April 6, 2010 (Tuesday) at 11:00 am in Martinsburg (MountainHeart office)

April 28, 2010 (Wednesday) at 9:00 am in Charles Town (Jefferson County DHHR)

May 4, 2010 (Tuesday) at 10:00 am in Elkins (Randolph County DHHR)

May 18, 2010 (Tuesday) at 11:00 am in Martinsburg (MountainHeart office)

**Space is limited. Only twelve participants per class will be allowed.** Slots will be filled on a first come, first serve basis. You **MUST PRE-REGISTER at least five (5) days in advance of the training session** by calling the Elkins MountainHeart office at (304) 637-2840 or 1-877-862-3103 (toll free). If all spaces are taken, you may place staff members on the waiting list in the event that a slot becomes available. If the minimum number of participants is not met for a training session, the session will be cancelled.

IMPORTANT NOTICE: Staff members must be registered on the WV S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway before taking the medication administration training. You will not be permitted to attend the training session if you are not currently on the S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway. All participants will need to bring their S.T.A.R.S. Pathway certificate with ID number and/or their feedback letter from WV S.T.A.R.S. stating that they have been approved and their certificate will be mailed soon. If staff attend the training and are not on the S.T.A.R.S. Career Pathway, the training will not count towards licensing requirements.

The training session is 4 ½ hours long (including two 15 minute breaks).

Participants must pass the Medication Administration competency test with 80% accuracy in order to pass the training and obtain a certificate.

Each participant must bring the following materials to the training: pencil or pen, paper, 1 pair of non-latex gloves, 1 doll baby.

Reminder: Children may not attend the training session.

# Components of Quality Care and Education

CQCE modules are a 32-hour training that will cover a variety of topics. The modules were developed to meet the requirements of the WV Early Learning standards. **Participants <u>must</u> be STARS registered before attending the training.** Each child care provider who completes the training may receive free resources for use in their home or child care center. # Training Topics Offered April - June 2010

<u>Childhood Behavior Issues</u>. Core Competency: Positive Interactions and Relationships. Participants will receive information from James Weber on the causes of behavioral issues along with prevention methods. There will be a discussion of behavioral concerns in the child care setting before a personal contract is signed. (Advanced)

<u>Developmentally Appropriate Guidance</u>. Core Competency: Positive Interactions and Relationships. Tara Bowley will teach this two hour training in which participants will learn how to take part in developmentally appropriate guidance approaches and learn to base expectation for behavior on age and the developmental level of the child. (Intermediate)

<u>Don't Put Me in the Middle: Working Through Divorce with School-Age Children</u>. Core Competency: Family and Community. Tara Bowley will teach this two hour training in which participants will learn the effects of divorce on families, red flags and warning signs, and implications and applications in regards to school age children who are dealing with divorce or separation. (Beginner)

<u>Early Signs of Autism</u>. Core Competency: Child Growth and Development. Erin Lash from WV Birth to Three will be presenting information regarding how to recognize signs of autism in children under 3 years old. Autism is on the rise in the United States, we as child care providers should be aware of this epidemic to better serve our children. This will count towards 2 hours of infant/toddler credit and cultural diversity if you are working towards Tier II reimbursement. (Beginner)

<u>Eat Well, Play Hard</u>. Core Competency: Health, Safety, and Nutrition. Sarah Hicks, Nurse Health Consultant, will teach this training which has been inspired by CHOOSY. Participants will be receiving age appropriate ideas for getting children moving, and ideas for healthy but fun snacks and meals. (Beginner)

<u>Please Don't Hurt Me</u>. Core Competency: Health, Safety, and Nutrition. Melodee Price has developed a new Child Abuse training to educate child care providers on the signs of abuse and what to do as mandatory reports. This will count towards the 2 hours of required training in Child Abuse for center based staff. (Intermediate)

<u>Reflective Supervision</u>. Core Competency: Professionalism. Find out how to establish a working relationship between you as a supervisor and your staff that mirrors the relationship between parents, infant/toddlers, and caregivers. Shannon Nichols will teach this session which is designed **specifically for center/facility directors**. (Intermediate)

<u>School-Age Care Environment Rating Scale.</u> Core Competency: Program Management. Tara Bowley will teach how to do a self evaluation using the SACERS. This is a requirement if you are applying for Tier II reimbursement when serving school age children in a center. **This training is for child care providers who work in a center**. A center is a business that is licensed for 12 or more children. (Intermediate)

<u>Sleep: Nutrition for the Brain</u>. Core Competency: Child Observation and Assessment. This training will count towards 2 hours of Infant/Toddler credit. Cheryl Wolfe will be presenting this training. It will give child care providers and parents information about how sleep affects "every facet of our children's daily life." You will also learn how observations and assessments of sleep habits will influence children's behavior and learning. (Intermediate)

<u>Understanding Child Care Regulations</u>. Core Competency: Program Management. Mary Hayden, with Early Care and Education, will review current child care regulations, policies, and quality standards. (Intermediate)

What's Up with Block Play? Core Competency: Curriculum. Did you know that blocks are one of the most valuable learning materials for our children? Come and get themes/ideas to use in the block area, learn differences in play/learning according to the age of the child playing with blocks and how to make blocks by recycling. You will look at blocks in a whole different way after attending class with Melodee Price. (Beginner)


